A Christmas Festival

Orchestra and singers

7 minutes

There are lots of Christmas carols packed into this medley! How many carols do you recognize? It begins with orchestra only and the singing begins after about two minutes.

México, Ángel y Pastor

Orchestra

3 minutes

The Mexican composer Silvino Jaramillo wrote many villancicos (Christmas carols), using the traditional rhythms and instruments of his country. Orchestras and choruses throughout Mexico perform them every holiday season. The Boston Pops play "México, Ángel y Pastor," one of Jaramillo's most famous villancicos.

The Good News Voyage

Orchestra and singers, with projections

The Holiday Pops Singers perform a joyous medley of three traditional songs called spirituals. These songs come from the folk music of African Americans and people of African descent in the Caribbean.

Songs:

- Go Tell It on the Mountain
- Rise, Shine for Your Light Is Coming
- Mary Had a Baby Boy

These songs are accompanied by beautiful illustrations by Ashley Bryan.



● Of Lights, Nights, and Brass

Brass section and drum set

4 minutes

The Boston Pops brass section plays a high-energy arrangement of Jewish tunes in celebration of Hanukkah. Some of the parts are very fast! The interesting title "Of Lights, Nights, and Brass" brings to mind the Lights on the menorah, the eight Nights of the festival, and the Brass instruments that play the song.

How the Grinch Stole Christmas

Orchestra and singers, with narration and projections

The singers narrate and sing this famous Dr. Seuss tale. The Grinch tries to ruin Christmas for the town of Whoville by stealing the presents, decorations, and other things. The Whos celebrate anyway! The Grinch learns that Christmas is about so much more than material things. He is so moved by the Whos' spirit that his heart grows three times bigger!

Sleigh Ride

Orchestra

3 minutes

"Sleigh Ride" is a very popular holiday song—you have probably heard it on TV, in movies, in stores, and in the car. Leroy Anderson wrote it specifically for the Boston Pops! Anderson wrote the piece on a hot summer day in July 1943, imagining the cold weather. At the end, listen for the horse! Who is making that sound?

Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer

Orchestra with projections

2 minutes

The Boston Pops play a set of a gentle, fun variations on the song "Rudolph the Red-Nose Reindeer." Notice how the tune keeps coming back in different ways!

A Visit from St. Nicholas

Orchestra and narrator with projections

4 minutes

Another Boston Pops favorite, "A Visit from St. Nicholas" features the traditional poem better known by its first line, "'Twas the Night Before Christmas," by Clement Clarke Moore, accompanied by beautiful images from the children's book author Jan Brett.

Santa Claus Is Coming to Town

Orchestra and Chorus

2 minutes

No one can resist the magic of the holidays with the Boston Pops—including Santa Claus himself! Santa makes his grand entrance during "Santa Claus Is Coming to Town." He will enter the hall, waving to friends in the audience (that's you!) along the way. You can wave back! This version of "Santa Claus Is Coming to Town" includes part of the song "'Zat You, Santa Claus?," made popular by the jazz trumpeter and singer Louis Armstrong.
