The Boston Symphony Orchestra, the Boston Pops, and the Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra Celebrate the Music and Culture of America in November's *E Pluribus Unum: From Many, One*Programs

Events at Symphony Hall during the first two weeks of November feature the **Boston Symphony Orchestra**, the **Boston Pops**, and the **Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra** performing music by composers and musicians from Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Cuba.

Part of <u>E Pluribus Unum: From Many, One</u>, a multi-season exploration of the plurality of American identity, the November concerts and humanities events probe how the crosscurrents of the art form reflect and parallel societal change in our nation and deepen our understanding of American identity and its historical, cultural, and intellectual landscapes through the many voices represented.

E Pluribus Unum events in November include:

- The Pops' second annual Día de Muertos concert in tribute to the hugely successful Mexican pop star Juan Gabriel with conductor Keith Lockhart and guest soloists Veronica Robles, Ely Guerra, and La Marisoul (Nov.1).
- Guest conductor Dima Slobodeniouk leading three BSO performances and a High School Open Rehearsal with a world premiere commission by acclaimed Cuban American composer Tania León and jazz great James Carter as soloist in Roberto Sierra's Concerto for Saxophones and Orchestra (Nov. 13-15).
- A free "What I Hear" program at New England Conservatory with composer
 León as guest (Nov. 13).
- The Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra performing works by composers from the island with Maximiano Valdés conducting and cuatro star Luis Sanz as soloist in the orchestra's Boston debut (Nov. 14).
- A "crash course" on Puerto Rican history told through the music of megastar Bad Bunny led by Yale University Professor Albert Laguna with Sanz and composer Angélica Negrón joining (Nov. 14).

More details about each November *E Pluribus Unum* program follow and are available in the <u>press kit</u> along with photos and bios of the guest artists.

The *E Pluribus Unum* focus continues in January with a to-be-announced festival of humanities events supporting the BSO's previously announced concert programs that feature music by American composers like Samuel Barber, Leonard Bernstein, Carlos Simon, John Williams, and others.

A Tribute to El Divo de Juárez: Celebrating Día de Muertos

Saturday, November 1, 7:30 p.m.*

The Boston Pops and conductor Keith Lockhart present their second annual Día de Muertos (Day of the Dead) program to mark the widely celebrated Mexican holiday of remembrance and reverence. This year's musical program honors the rich legacy of the iconic singer and songwriter Juan Gabriel ("El Divo de Juárez"), a trailblazing talent who redefined Mexico's music scene with his flamboyant style across genres from mariachi to disco. Singer, musician, dancer, and Latina cultural leader Veronica Robles returns to perform one of Gabriel's best-known ballads, "Querida" (Beloved) and "Tata Dios," a traditional folksong about accepting death. Other special guests are GRAMMY-winning Mexican singer-songwriter Ely Guerra and La Marisoul, lead singer of the GRAMMYwinning Latin music band La Santa Cecilia, performing both their own music and the hits of Gabriel. The program opens with the Pops performing the pulsating Antrópolis by Gabriela Ortiz, drawn from the sounds of Mexico City's dance halls and nightclubs. Traditional *Día de Muertos* food and drink, available as an add-on pre-concert buffet, as well as festive decorations, complement the evening's program.

World Premiere of Tania León's *Time for Time*and Works by Roberto Sierra and Brahms

Headlining these **Boston Symphony Orchestra** performances led by frequent guest conductor **Dima Slobodeniouk** is the exciting world premiere of *Time to Time* by renowned Cuban American composer Tania León. Commissioned by the BSO, the new work reveals the composer's characteristic preoccupation with rhythm and duration. León, a 2022 Kennedy Center Honors awardee for lifetime artistic achievement, co-directed the Festival of Contemporary Music at Tanglewood in 2024. She won the 2021 Pulitzer Prize in Music for *Stride*, a work inspired by the women's suffrage movement, which the BSO performed in 2024. The program also includes Latin GRAMMY Award winner and Puerto Rico-born Roberto Sierra's effervescent Concerto for Saxophones and Orchestra with jazz virtuoso **James Carter** as guest soloist on soprano and tenor saxophones. Brahms' warm, pastoral Symphony No. 2, inspired by a visit to an Austrian lakeside resort, rounds out the program.

The Nov. 13 **High School Open Rehearsal** matinee for students in grades 8-12 is preceded by a 9:30 a.m. pre-concert talk by BSO Director of Program Publications **Robert Kirzinger**. Boston Public School students and teachers may attend at no charge with advance reservation; students and groups from other schools are welcome to attend at a discounted rate. <u>More information on High School Open Rehearsals</u>.

The Nov. 13 "What I Hear" program brings composer Tania León into conversation with BSO Artistic Administrator Eric Valliere as part of a free series of composer visits and short chamber music programs by New England Conservatory students. It takes place from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. at NEC's Brown Hall (30 Gainsborough St.). Other upcoming "What I Hear" dates are here.

Crash Course: Bad Bunny & Beyond Musical Aesthetics and Puerto Rican History

Friday, November 14, 6:00-7:00 p.m.

In this dynamic lecture, Yale University scholar **Dr. Albert Laguna** examines Puerto Rican history, politics, and identity through the sounds that shape it—from global pop culture megastar Bad Bunny to the Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra performing later the same evening. Professor Laguna's Yale course, which uses the music of Bad Bunny as a lens to explore aesthetics, migration, colonialism, and resistance, was featured in a *New York Times* story in April.

The program includes a short performance by celebrated cuatro musician **Luis Sanz**, guest soloist with Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra and a collaborator on Bad Bunny's most recent album, which was recorded in Puerto Rico and is a tribute to his roots. Composer and multi-instrumentalist **Angélica Negrón**, whose work is also performed in the Puerto Rico Symphony's program, joins the conversation with Professor Laguna and Sanz. The event concludes with a Q&A. Drawing from both popular and classical repertoire, this "crash course" invites audiences to hear the ways music reveals deeper cultural and historical shifts.

The event takes place at Symphony Hall. Doors will open at 5:30pm and attendees are requested to enter through the Cohen Wing entrance on Huntington Ave. Cocktails and refreshments are available for purchase during the program. A separate ticket is required to attend the evening performance of the Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra.

Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra Performs Music of the Caribbean in its Boston Debut

Friday, November 14, 7:30 p.m.

Presented in association with *Inquilinos Boricuas en Acción*, the **Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra** (*Orquesta Sinfónica de Puerto Rico*) makes its first-ever Boston appearance to perform works that showcase the vibrant musical traditions of Puerto Rico and beyond. The orchestra was founded in 1958 by legendary cellist and humanitarian Pablo Casals. Under the leadership of its longtime Music Director **Maximiano Valdés**, who is completing his final season with the orchestra after a distinguished tenure of 18 years, the Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra continues to serve as the leading symphonic institution of Puerto Rico and a cultural pillar of the Caribbean.

In a spirited program led by Valdés, the orchestra performs a variety of works inspired by Puerto Rico's landscape, history, and culture. Cuatro virtuoso **Luis Sanz** joins as soloist in Ernesto Cordero's Descarga movement from his *Concierto Criollo* for cuatro and orchestra. The cuatro, a small guitar, holds a central place Puerto Rican traditional and popular music.

Angélica Negrón's *Moriviví* evokes a common plant (the *Mimosa pudica* or shameplant) that closes its leaves when touched; the plant sparked the composer's imagination as a young girl. An arrangement of Puerto Rican songwriter Noel Estrada's beloved bolero *En mi Viejo San Juan* ("In my old San Juan"), written when the composer was a homesick soldier serving in the Army during World War II, is an ode to the beauty of his island home. Alfonso Fuentes composed his *Rapsodia Urbana* based on the sounds he heard following Hurricane Maria's devastation of Puerto Rico in 2017. The program also includes

two movements from symphonies by the Puerto Rico-born composer Roberto Sierra: Memoria urbana from Symphony No. 6 (a BSO co-commission given its American premiere by the BSO in March 2024) and Karirós y Apoteósis from Symphony No. 7. The Ukrainian-born Puerto Rican composer Jack Délano's *La Bruja de Loíza* ("Loíza's Witch"), Luis Quintana's *On the Ethereal Nature of Bioluminescence*, Juan Morel Campos's *Felices días* ("Happy Days"), and José Pujals's *Fragmentos de mi tierra* ("Fragments of My Land") complete the muchanticipated Boston debut of this acclaimed visiting orchestra.
